IN REMEMBRANCE

Antonio Johnson was born Oct. 30, 1953, to Clarence and Roberta Johnson. He grew up in the Walnut Hills area and attended Roger Bacon High School.

Johnson began his academic career at Xavier University in June of 1971. While majoring in urban studies, he participated in the school band and was an active member of St. Andrews Roman Catholic Church. Johnson worked hard and dedicated his time to the Black Student Association as president, earning him the respect of the Xavier campus and the adjoining communities. He stressed the importance of minority independence, strength and development.

Johnson single-handedly organized and implemented activities for Black Awareness Month in February 1976. Unfortunately, he was unable to see the results of his hard work because he died on Feb. 8, 1976, at age 22. Johnson is remembered as a caring, compassionate, confident and articulate individual who was dedicated to the principles of social change and justice.

Each year, the Black Student Association keeps his memory alive through the Antonio Johnson Scholarship Banquet. A scholarship is presented to an African-American junior for his or her academic excellence, leadership, contribution to the Black Student Association and community service.

THE GREGG BACON QUARTET



Indianapolis native Gregg Bacon has been "makin' bacon" with his sizzling saxophones for 35 years. "A recycled R&B guy" who has sung background and played the blues, Bacon is one of the most versatile entertainers in the nation, playing 12 horns and the flute. His latest album, "Our New America," captures the essence of this extraordinary performer. Bacon taught himself to play two saxophones at the same time, and eventually added a third instrument, turning himself into one of the hottest showmen on the jazz scene.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

DR. O'DELL M. OWENS



Dr. Owens, a native Cincinnatian, graduated from Woodward High School and went on to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree from Antioch College, spending his third year of college at Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda, as a foreign exchange student. He earned his M.D. and a master's degree in public health from Yale University.

He continued his studies at Yale as an intern, resident and chief resident in obstetrics and gynecology before accepting a combined position at Harvard Medical School as a clinical instructor in the department of OB/GYN and a fellowship in reproductive endocrinology and infertility.

Dr. Owens returned to Cincinnati in 1982 to establish the first division of reproductive endocrinology in the department of OB/GYN at the University of Cincinnati Medical Center. During his four-year tenure, he established an in-vitro fertilization program and oversaw Cincinnatiís first successful conception and delivery.

In addition to infertility issues, Dr. Owen also has an interest in laser surgery. In 1987, the Chinese Medical Society asked him to participate in an international symposium and lecture series on laser surgery in China. In July 1990, the American Laser Society asked him to join a group of physicians to tour the laser facilities in four major cities in the Soviet Union. In 1992, the American Jewish Committee selected Dr. Owens to visit Israel as part of a national group of Afro-Americans to evaluate the Israeli/Arab conflict firsthand.

Black Enterprise Magazine named Dr. Owens one of the top 15 black doctors in America in its October 1988 issue. He has been also been honored with the Tree of Life Award from the Jewish National Fund, the Lincoln Award from Northern Kentucky University and an honorary PhD from the University of Cincinnati. Owens is also the youngest person inducted into the Ohio Independent College Hall of Excellence.

In 2004, Dr. Owens was elected Hamilton County Coroner. He also serves as the president and chair for Project GRAD (Graduation Really Achieves Dreams), a collaborative of the Cincinnati Public School system. He formerly served as president and CEO of RISE Learning Solutions and as the senior medical director of United Healthcare of Ohio.

Dr. Owens is on the board of directors for US Bank and the Greater Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky Airport. He is the former chair of the Cincinnati Public Schools Superintendent Advisory Committee, the Cincinnati Public Schools, the Cincinnati Board of Health and the University of Cincinnati board of trustees.

Dr. Owens is actively involved in the Cincinnati community by working with disadvantaged youth to motivate them to reach their full potential. He says he would like his epitaph to read, "He made a difference."

HISTORY OF THE BLACK STUDENT ASSOCIATION

During the 1960s, Xavier University, along with many other American universities, experienced racial strife. African-American students attending Xavier in the 1960s wanted privileges and opportunities similar to those of their white counterparts. In 1969, the University recognized the need and created the Office of Urban Affair, which was designed to assist African-American students in their pursuit of higher education.

In conjunction with this office, the Black Student Association, formerly called the Afro-American Student Association, was formed to help meet the needs of African-American students. Ken Blackwell, Tony Davis, Wes Turner, Barbara Milon, Alicia Coggins and Amelia Tucker were the pioneers of this organization. The organization continues to commit itself to meeting the unique needs of African-American students at Xavier, and it serves as an integral lifeline that supports academic excellence, involved leadership and service to the community.
