### First-Year Seminar

The First-Year Seminar (FYS) provides the opportunity for students to work closely with faculty to explore important and challenging issues. All undergraduates entering Xavier in Fall 2015 are required to take a FYS within two semesters of their arrival.

### FYS Goals: Students will...

- 1) Become engaged in intellectually challenging and interesting questions and problems
- 2) Develop strong mentoring relationships with faculty in and out of the classroom
- 3) Join the community of scholars at Xavier University
- 4) Establish a solid foundation on which subsequent Core Curriculum courses will build
- 5) Engage with a common theme across all seminars.

#### **Current Status:**

- There are 42 sections for Fall 2015 (See topics on back of page).
- Courses are being offered by 28 faculty from 13 departments (9 CAS; 4 CSSHE).
- 660 first-year students are registered for FYS courses.
- 40 sections are expected to be offered in Spring 2016, plus one for transfer students if needed.

**Overall Goal:** Develop the First-Year Seminar into a signature Xavier experience in which first-year undergraduates become passionate and effective learners and develop mentoring relationships with faculty.

# Plans for 2015-16 (from Rachel Chrastil):

- 1) Ensure that staffing meets the needs of students, faculty, departments and fiscal responsibility.
- 2) Develop faculty who are prepared to meet the needs of first-year students so that they can fulfill a demanding set of course goals and student learning objectives.
  - A Summer Institute with 30 faculty in attendance was held in May at which faculty designed an assessment process that will be implemented this academic year
- 3) Develop a registration process.
  - FYS team will work with the CCC to develop CORE 150 for transfer students, and develop a plan for students who fail or otherwise do not complete CORE 100 in their first year.
- 4) Embed FYS in the fabric of university life.
