

- 1. ALUMNI IN INDIANA. 14% of Earlham's nearly 17,000 alumni live in Indiana. They are scientists, teachers, lawyers, ministers, executives, physicians, writers – concerned leaders, involved citizens and caring parents, achieving their personal career goals while making a difference in the world. A number of recent entrepreneurial ventures in east central Indiana have been started by Earlham graduates.
- 2. STUDENTS FROM INDIANA. Earlham actively recruits students from Indiana. 20% of our students come from small, medium and large public and private schools in Indiana. Nearly half of all Earlham student athletes are from Indiana. Earlham's Graduate Programs in Education (both a Master of Arts in Teaching and a Master of Education) prepare teachers who are much in demand among local school corporations.
- **3. FINANCIAL AID.** Earlham makes an extraordinary effort to support low- and moderate-income students. Last year Earlham awarded about \$17 million in financial aid grants. Nearly 20% of our domestic students are eligible for Pell Grants. In 2007-08, 120 current Earlham students received nearly \$750,000 from the State Student Assistance Commission of Indiana, averaging a state grant of about \$6,250.
- 4. INTERNATIONAL FOCUS. Students from over 70 countries choose to attend Earlham. The College not only brings the world to Indiana but also takes Indiana to the world. About 2/3 of Earlham's students study overseas on semester- or year-long programs. Indiana students have traveled on Earlham's international programs to England, New Zealand, Germany, Austria, Tanzania, Mexico, Spain, Japan, India and many more!
- 5. MISSION. From its establishment by the Religious Society of Friends in 1847, the College has been committed to preparing graduates for engagement with a changing world. Overall, Earlham alumni believe the College greatly enhanced their understanding of societal and moral problems and their ability to relate to people of different cultures and races.

- 6. A COMMUNITY OF LEARNERS. Earlham's first-year students report that they contribute to class discussion at a rate higher than that reported by first-year students nationally. Earlham seniors report working with faculty members on activities other than coursework — committees, orientation, student life activities significantly more often than the national average.
- 7. COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT. Earlham cooperates with local economic development agencies, chambers of commerce and others in recruiting firms to our community. The College sponsors internships with local firms and non-profit agencies providing educational experiences for our students and providing opportunities for local employers to employ our graduates. Earlham students, faculty and staff contribute more than 50,000 hours of volunteer service, leadership and expertise to more than 70 local agencies each year.
- 8. ACADEMIC OUTCOMES. The success of Earlham graduates is reflected in their selection for many highly competitive fellowships and scholarships for postgraduate study. These include Carnegie Endowment, Fulbright, Mellon, Watson and National Science Foundation fellowships, as well as Goldwater and Truman scholarships.
- **9. PH.D. PRODUCTION.** The College ranks 23rd in the percentage of students who go on to earn doctoral degrees among 1,469 colleges and universities nationwide. 44% of Earlham alumni who graduated in the last 10 years enrolled in graduate or professional school.
- **10. ECONOMIC IMPACT.** One of the 10 largest employers in Wayne County, Earlham College's financial contribution both in goods and services and in student spending adds \$44 million to the local economy each year. Earlham is also Richmond's educational leader in its support of the United Way's agencies and programs.

Earlham College,

a selective, private, liberal arts college, offers a challenging intellectual environment. Established in 1847 by the Society of Friends, Earlham is rooted in the ideals of Quakerism.

Earlham College attracts 1,200 students from 44 states and 74 countries. Thirty percent of Earlham students were in the top 10% of their high school graduating class. More than 26% are American minority or international students.
