Statement of Purpose

The Music Program prepares majors, within a diverse and broadly based liberal arts curriculum, to enter the fields of music and music education, pursue graduate-level education, or enter occupations outside of music that require a solid foundation in the liberal arts. All degree programs emphasize a broad coverage of the field of music and reflect Xavier's philosophy of combining a strong liberal arts core with a major area of study.

The Music Program is committed to the advancement of knowledge through the study of music as an art and a science. This study encompasses music theory, music history, pedagogy, aesthetics, music education, and musical performance.

All curricula in the Music Program seek to educate students through scholarly research, the study of music scores and performance, and through creative and interpretive studies in the area of applied music. These combined educational experiences develop mature citizens in today's diverse society.

Degree Programs

The Music Program offers three undergraduate degree programs: the Bachelor of Arts in Music, with two concentrations (Music Performance and Music Production), and the Bachelor of Music in Music Education. Bachelor of Arts in Music (B. A.), Music Performance Concentration: 36 Hours

The traditional liberal arts degree provides training and study in the core areas of music while leaving room for a second major, with this concentration dedicating a third of its courses to performance. Curriculum components include:

- Theory: Music Theory I-III
- Musicianship: Studio, Recital Attendance, Aural Skills I-IV, Keyboard Skills I-II
- History: Music History I-II, Rock/Pop/R&B Performance: Private Lessons, Ensembles

Bachelor of Arts in Music (B. A.), Music Production Concentration: 36 Hours

The traditional liberal arts degree provides training and study in the core areas of music while leaving room for a second major, with this concentration dedicating a third of its courses to music technology and production. Curriculum components include:

- Theory: Music Theory I-II
- Musicianship: Studio, Recital Attendance, Aural Skills I-II, Keyboard Skills I-II
- **History**: Music History I or II, Rock/Pop/R&B
- Production: GarageBand/Logic, Audio Production, Studio Production, Internship
- **Performance**: Private Lessons, Ensembles

Bachelor of Music in Music Education (B. M.): 95 Hours

The professional degree in Music Education prepares students for a K-12 teaching career. Graduating students will be certified to teach band, choir, orchestra, and elementary music. Curriculum components include:

- **Theory**: Music Theory I-III, Orchestration & Arranging, Form & Analysis, Technology for Music Educators
- Musicianship: Studio, Recital Attendance, Aural Skills I-IV, Keyboard Skills I-IV, Conducting I-II, Class Guitar or Voice

• Performance: Private Lessons, Ensembles, Senior Recital

• Methods: Elementary, Choral, Instrumental

• Techniques: Strings, Woodwinds, Brass, Percussion

Block Schedules and Course Checklists

The following pages contain block schedules (4-year course sequences) and detailed course checklists (including core courses) for each of the three major degree programs. These are essential tools when registering for classes each semester, and students must pay special attention to the five "flags": ERS, Diversity, Writing, Oral Communication, and Quantitative Reasoning. For students in the large professional degrees it is especially important to find flagged courses in the core, since they must otherwise take additional courses in order to fulfill core requirements. Since the ERS and Diversity flags predate the others by many years, courses with those attributes are relatively abundant, but core courses with the three remaining flags are not (yet). Therefore, students should search for core courses that fulfill those three requirements every semester (this is done by searching the online schedule by "attribute type"). GUIDELINES AND POLICIES FOR MUSIC MAJORS AND MINORS

ACCEPTANCE INTO THE MUSIC PROGRAM

To be considered for acceptance to the Music Program at Xavier University, students must complete a formal audition. Program faculty select students for the program based on potential for success within the program.

Vocal or Instrumental Tracks

Although our BA degree has officially declared concentrations, students must still follow a **Vocal or Instrumental Track** by enrolling in the appropriate private lesson and primary ensemble (students may freely enroll in additional lessons and ensembles):

- Vocal: Private Voice (MUSC 282) and Concert Choir (MUSC 260)
- Instrumental: MUSC 280-99 and Symphonic Wind Ensemble (MUSC 265) or Chamber Orchestra (MUSC 270)

Students in the liberal arts degree (B.A.) may also choose **Composition or Songwriting** as their path by enrolling in Composition or Songwriting lessons (MUSC 278 or 279), with the <u>added requirement</u> that they must also register for at least half-hour vocal or instrumental lessons.

Since admission to the program is based on an audition on a specific instrument (incl. voice), students must register for private lessons on that same instrument for the required number of semesters. Changing the primary instrument requires approval of the Program Director or Department Chair and a new audition. Students may freely choose secondary instruments.

LARGE & SMALL ENSEMBLES

For music majors, ensemble experience is divided into large ensemble and small ensemble. Large ensemble experiences include MUSC 260: Concert Choir, MUSC 265: Symphonic Wind Ensemble, MUSC 270: Chamber Orchestra. All other ensemble experiences are considered small ensemble.

PRIVATE LESSONS

Private instruction (MUSC 278-99) is available as half-hour lessons (.5 credit, section xxx-01) or full-hour lessons (1 credit, section xxx-02; or 2 credits, section xxx-03). **Only full-hour lessons count toward Music degrees**. Private lessons are charged an <u>additional fee</u> per semester: \$300 for half-hour lessons, \$600 for full-hour lessons.

ADVISING

All music students will be assigned a full-time music faculty member as their advisor. Students are required to schedule an advising appointment each semester.

STUDIO CLASS

Required for majors and strongly recommended for Music Performance minors, Studio Class (MUSC 198) provides students with a forum in which to perform for peers. It may also feature master classes,

coaching sessions, pedagogy instruction, or guest performances. Vocal and Instrumental Studios meet either in separate and sometimes combined sessions on Fridays at 2:00 p.m.

RECITAL ATTENDANCE

Majors and minors are required to attend a minimum number of music events, tracked by registering for Recital Attendance (MUSC 199) as follows: (the syllabus contains more details)

Music Education: 7 semesters Music (B.A.): 6 semesters Minors: 3 semesters

To fulfill the recital attendance requirement, students must attend 7 events per semester, of which no more than 3 may be off-campus.

- Acceptable events: on-campus music events, CCM music events, professional music events.
- Unacceptable events: high school productions, events in which you participate

STUDENT RECITAL PARTICIPATION

Public recitals in which music students are required to perform are held at various times each semester, and the following guidelines apply:

- Music majors must perform in a recital on their primary instrument during each semester of private lessons
- Composition majors must have a piece performed in a recital during each semester of private lessons
- Music Performance minors must perform in at least four recitals during their semesters of private lessons
- Performance selections must be approved by the instructor and are due in the office two weeks prior to the recital date (selections not submitted by the deadline will <u>not</u> be on the program)
- The recital performance constitutes the <u>midterm</u> of the private lesson
- Students who do not perform in a recital cannot pass the private lesson (although an adjunct professor may request an exemption for a student in the first semester of study)

BOARDS/JURY EXAMINATIONS

During finals week of each semester, all music majors and Music Perfomance minors taking private lessons must complete a boards examination by performing for a jury panel. This performance constitutes the final exam of the private lesson.

The number of compositions, technical exercises studied during the semester, and progress from one semester to the next will also be taken into consideration. The primary instructor is responsible for the requirements for boards.

The student will be graded as follows:

- Pass with distinction
- Pass
- · Pass with reservation
- Fail

While the jurors will make a recommendation, the instructor will determine the semester grade. Students who fail the exam will be informed by the faculty and required to meet with their advisor to review their applied standing in the Music Program, their music and non-music academic record, and scholarship eligibility (where applicable).

DRESS CODE FOR RECITALS & BOARDS

Recitals and boards are considered professional performances. Professional dress is required, as defined by the private instructor. Any questions should be addressed with the private lessons instructor.

JUNIOR & SENIOR RECITALS

Junior Recital

The junior recital is a half recital consisting of 20 minutes of music, usually given during the second semester of junior year. A junior recital is optional for all students in all degree programs. Those electing to give a junior recital should consult with their primary teaching and follow all guidelines for boards outlined below.

Senior Recital (MUSC 450)

Given during the final semester of private lessons, the senior recital is a half or full recital consisting of 20 or 40 minutes of music.

- Bachelor of Arts in Music: Recital is optional
- Bachelor of Music in Music Education: Half recital is required (may be full if approved by instructor)
- Music Performance Minor: Recital is optional

N.B.—Students giving a junior or senior recital are exempt from student recital and boards that semester.

The following guidelines apply to all student recitals:

- 1. The recital must be scheduled at least <u>three months prior</u> to the performance date. Requests for dates should go to Shelley Barsan. Venues outside the purview of Xavier Music require special permission and must be arranged/negotiated by the student. Students must make every effort to avoid conflicts with Music Program events when scheduling. When time, date, and location have been confirmed, the student should notify their instructor, Shelley Barsan (to coordinate dates), and Polina Bespalko (to coordinate piano tuning).
- 2. All repertoire must be approved by the instructor.
- 3. A recital hearing is held three weeks before the recital to determine student preparedness. Three faculty members, including the primary instructor, must be present for the hearing. The student is responsible for coordinating the hearing with all parties. The student must bring the appropriate form to the recital hearing. Recital hearings may result in approval for the recital performance as scheduled, requirement of an additional hearing with improvements as recommended by the hearing committee, or a cancelation of the recital coinciding with in an F for the course.
- 4. The following will be due to the faculty panel at the time of the hearing:
 - A copy of the complete program for the recital. This should include composer dates, translations, and program notes for each piece (no more than a paragraph for each).
- 5. The following statements must appear on each senior recital program:
 - a. This recital is given in partial fulfillment of the [Degree Title]
 - b. [Student Name] is a student of [Faculty Name]

ACCOMPANIST/VOCAL COACH GUIDELINES

Nearly all music majors and minors taking private lessons require an accompanist for recitals and boards as well as for rehearsals in preparation for those events. The coordinator, Dr. Polina Bespalko, organizes all accompanying services in collaboration with the applied instructors.

The standard rate for all accompaniments at Xavier is **\$42 per hour.** Fees for junior and senior recitals will vary, and must be negotiated between the student and pianist. Payment is due to the pianist on the day of the performance (recital or board).

Junior/Senior Recitals

Students presenting a Junior or Senior Recital must independently hire an accompanist of their choosing. If none of our accompanists is available on the scheduled recital date, the Accompanist Coordinator will assist in finding an outside accompanist. Fees are negotiated between student and accompanist.

<u>Music</u>

The follow requirements apply to repertoire and scores:

- Scores must be provided 2 weeks ahead of any lesson or rehearsal, 4 weeks ahead of any performance
- Score copies must be clearly legible and contain the entire page of music
- Copies must be single-sided
- Each piece must be clearly labeled with the name of the student
- Digital copies should be emailed to the pianist, if requested
- Senior recital music must be provided to the pianist by the end of the first month of the semester
- Students failing to meet these requirements may still inquire about hiring a pianist, but are subject to paying the pianist's freelance fees.

Scheduling Rehearsals

It is the responsibility of the student to contact the accompanist via e-mail to schedule all rehearsals in a timely manner. If a student fails to show up to a scheduled rehearsal or lesson, he or she must pay for the scheduled session and is responsible for rescheduling.

INSTRUMENTS & LOCKERS

A limited number of instruments are available for use by students enrolled in music classes. Students wishing to check out an instrument should make an appointment to see Dr. Chamberlain to select an appropriate instrument, fill out the online instrument checkout form, and confirm the serial number with the administrative assistant in the Main Office. Students assume liability for any damage up to the full value of the instrument issued to them and are expected to maintain any university owned equipment.

Lockers are available for use by music students upon request. Locker space is limited. To reserve a locker, see the administrative assistant in the Main Office and fill out the appropriate form on the music website. Music students may also reserve a second locker as needed (for example, Music Education students taking Woodwind Techniques). Lockers must be secured with a lock, either provided by the student or purchased in the Main Office. N.B.—Any equipment stored in lockers without approval will be removed. Any locks placed on lockers without approval will be destroyed and removed.

SPACES IN EDGECLIFF

Edgecliff 104 is a dedicated workspace for faculty. Adjoining spaces include faculty offices. Edgecliff 104 is not for students use (including printing and computer services).

Edgecliff 105 is the **Main Office**. There you will find the offices of Shelley Barsan, administrative assistant; Dr. Morten Kristiansen, music program director; and Dr. Ben Chamberlain, chair of the Department of Music & Theatre.

Practice Rooms are available for use by Xavier students, prospective students, and faculty for practice, composition, and Music Theory. Policies for practice room use may be found below. Students taking private piano lessons may also use Edgecliff 101, 202, and 205 for practice. Students taking private percussion lessons may also use Edgecliff B4 and 205 for practice.

Edgecliff B2 is specialized studio for Music Production students, as well as lessons in composition and songwriting. Access is strictly limited to those purposes.

Edgecliff B3 is a student lounge. The space has been provided as an area for students to socialize, break from study/practice, have a meal, etc. The student community is responsible for maintaining the area.

Room requests for club meetings, chamber rehearsals, and other student events should be directed to Shelley Barsan in the Main Office.

Edgecliff 201 is the Voice Studio. It is used primarily for voice lessons, secondarily for all other lessons, and may be reserved for practice, chamber rehearsal, coaching, etc. as availability permits.

Edgecliff 204, known affectionately as the "Theory Lab," is available for all students taking music classes during regular building hours when not used for course instruction.

PRACTICE ROOM POLICIES

- 1. Practice rooms are available on a first-come, first-served basis.
- 2. During peak hours, please observe a 2-hour maximum for continuous usage.
- 3. Practice rooms are reserved for music practicing only. Please do not use practice rooms for studying, connected remotely to classes, or resting.
- 4. No food or drink except closed containers of water are allowed in practice rooms.
- 5. Do not place personal belongings, instrument cases, or water bottles on the pianos.

- 6. Do not leave instruments or valuables unattended. Xavier University is not responsible for lost or stolen items.
- 7. Any room left unattended for more than 15 minutes can be occupied by another student. Instruments, backpacks and other belongings cannot be left in a practice room to reserve it for an absent person. Belongings should not be removed from the room, but will be collected by the absent person upon their return. The absent person forfeits the right to the room if gone more than 15 minutes.
- 8. Music stands, chairs, and other Music Program & Theatre equipment may not be removed from a practice room area. Please do not bring stands or chairs from other areas of the building to the practice room area. Please report missing equipment to Shelley Barsan in Edgecliff 105.
- 9. Teaching is not allowed in practice rooms unless scheduled in advance through the Main Office.
- 10. Remove all paper, water bottles, etc. from practice room when finished. If modified, reset the room chairs back into the original configuration and turn off room lights.
- 11. Please report any problems or building/room condition issues to the Main Office.
